

What does an incredible family look like?

The must-see film of the summer had to be *Incredibles 2*. As a treat for my daughter's 6th birthday (and to me after a week-long Summer Holiday Club dressed as Elastigirl) we intend to go and see it as a family before school starts back. Most children won't remember the first film *The Incredibles*, launched 14 years ago, but the parents probably will.

In the seven months since I took up post as Children and Families Worker for Dedham, I have enjoyed getting to know lots of families through church, at school and attending various community groups and events. I have spent a lot of time observing, listening, and chatting about what is important to you and I have drawn one simple conclusion. Dedham is full of incredible families, every bit as special as the one in the film. Introducing my own children to the first film, and reflecting on all the things I have learned talking to people in this parish, has helped me to learn some useful life lessons.

Take risks and find your passion

Mr Incredible went from saving the world to working as an insurance salesman, a role which was making him miserable. It would have been easy to stay in a stable, albeit boring job. Once he takes steps to start doing the things he loves he (re)-discovers his passion. Mr Incredible had the courage to quit and in doing so found value in himself and his family. This lesson is exemplified by none other than former Dedham Primary Head Teacher Mr Aylott who has gone on to pursue his own passions.

Never underestimate anyone

Just because someone's "superpower" is not

immediately obvious, it does not mean they are not capable of greatness. Jack-Jack seemed like just a helpless baby until he demonstrated his greatness. In our How to be a Superhero Holiday Club, 30 children from across our villages impressed us with their energy and talents to come together and work as a team. In doing so they drew inspiration from bible superheroes who, whilst ordinary in an everyday sense, went on to achieve extraordinary things. Dedham, with its strong sense of community spirit, certainly has its fair share of heroes. You just don't see them walking down the High Street in a costume.

You can always count on family

When Mr Incredible couldn't save himself, his family were able to step in and save him. All members of the Incredible family are superheroes, with a power that makes them unique. However, there is an additional motivation that drives them and when they come together as a family it makes them even stronger. Interestingly, as I talk to children about the things they enjoy most, they don't talk about themselves. Instead they speak with enthusiasm about how they love spending time together as a family.



Who wants to be a Sunbeam?

Quotes from children's books can be inspiring – they make us smile, make us cry and give reassurance in difficult times. One of my favourite passages comes from Roald Dahl's book, *The Twits*.

"A person who has good thoughts cannot ever be ugly. You can have a wonky nose and a crooked mouth and a double chin and stick-out teeth, but if you have good thoughts it will shine out of your face like sunbeams and you will always look lovely."

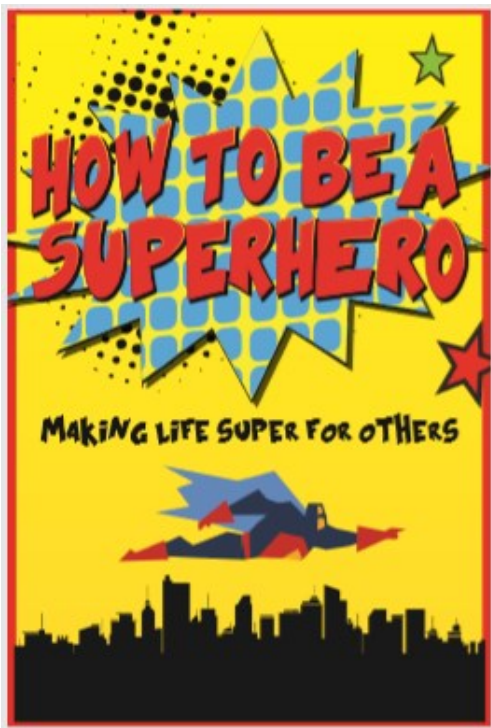
Lyrics from songs are equally influential. My childhood memories of Sunday School evoke memories of the hymn *Jesus wants me for a Sunbeam*. As a teenager, I went through something of a rebellious phase, one that drew me away from church for a time. Then, it was the lyrics of Nirvana that influenced me: *Jesus don't want me for a sunbeam, Sunbeams are never made like me*.

Fortunately, that was just a temporary phase in my life. When it came to thinking up an alternative to what parents will remember as Sunday School in our parish, there really was only one name that inspired me and seemed a perfect fit ... **Sunbeams**.

So, from September, a new Sunday morning club called Sunbeams will launch at The Assembly Rooms. Lasting one hour, Sunbeams will take place in The Reading Room on the 2nd and 3rd Sundays of the month. Come along at 9.15am for a 9.30am start.

This coming term there will be four sessions: 9th and 16th September and the 14th and 21st October and our focus will be on some follow up lessons from our *How to be Superhero* Holiday Club. We will be exploring team-

work, helping others, and introducing the concept of service in a fun and creative way.



Aimed mainly at primary school children, any children aged 3+ and their parents are welcome to attend. The content is very family friendly and will appeal to grown-ups as well as children.

Parents who would prefer to attend the church service can leave their children in the care of the leaders ... *who like to think good thoughts and always look lovely!*

SEPTEMBER UPDATE

Mobile phone signal

Volunteer needed...Mobile operators publish coverage maps, OFCOM also provides maps based on data from the mobile operators. But these suggest that in the village centre we do have good outdoor coverage for all operators and, operator dependant, good indoor coverage.

In practice most people do not find this to be the case. Given that we supposedly have good coverage and that mobile operators are reluctant to invest in the costly process of building masts, can anything be done to improve the situation?

How about the Church Tower? In discussions with Antony, he explains the diocese is finding engagement with the mobile operators very difficult due to lack of funding.

We need to gather data on what the actual mobile reception is like and then try to get the operators to take note of their possible lost revenue.

We would like a village centre resident to volunteer to lead on gathering this data. This will need every village centre resident and business to return a form that records their operator and the service that they get.

With actual information, the Parish Council will then be in a position to challenge the mobile operators and see if they can improve their service. So if you are a village centre resident, unhappy with your mobile service, think that something should be done about it, then please volunteer to help try to improve the situation. **Kevin Taylor**

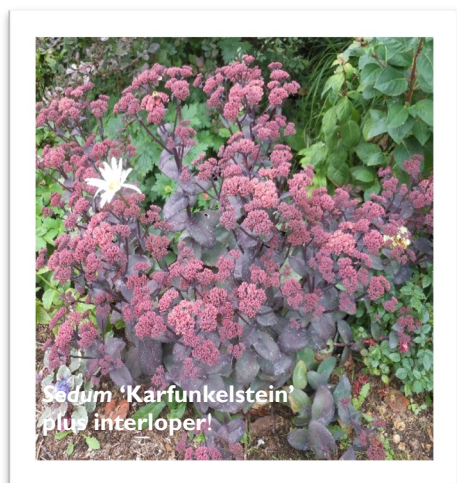

LITTLE DID WE KNOW

Back in May a speaker from The Beth Chatto Garden (unaware of the impending weather conditions) came to DHS and gave us a talk on *Making a Drought Resistant Garden*; had we known then that we were about to get a first-hand weather experience on drought we might have paid greater attention with note-books at the ready. Afterwards an array of plants for sale beckoned; however that's when a voice from somewhere reminds me there are still newcomers at home yet to be planted!



But there's always something that's not on *The Great List* – there it was – *Hylotelephium* 'Touchdown Teak' – almost black glaucous leaves forcing my hand to pick it up.

Well, what's one more? Alas when checking a few websites later on, this

unknown perennial was nothing more than a *Sedum* with a new unpronounceable name. Oh no, not another name change!

There are already seven varieties of *Sedum* (sorry, but I have to use the old name) on *The Great List*: they are among the best plants for attracting butterflies and bees, will grow in full sun and survive drought conditions. So, without knowing it then, I was ahead of the game.

Many of you will have *Sedum spectabile* 'Autumn Joy' (aka 'The Ice Plant') with its pale greeny/grey glaucous leaves and large flowers which turn pink, but there are several dark varieties which I grow for contrasting foliage in the south-facing 'white garden'. *S. 'Matrona'* has dark purple coloured stems and smaller flower heads; *S. 'Karfunkelstein'* (how's that for a name?) also has pink flowers but with shorter dark multi-branched stems so no flopping.

Then there's *S. 'Frosty Morn'* with green/white variegated foliage and white flowers – flanked by black-leaved *Ophiopogon* (a grass 'lookalike') to show it off. Close by *S. 'Rhubarb and Custard'* (also variegated) is *S. 'Coca Cola'* – not more than 5–10 cm high so ideal for ground cover in a gravel garden.

You could also add *S. 'Gooseberry Fool'* for a really tasty combination! Websites abound with more suggestions.

The pink flower heads of *S. spectabile* are ideal for a simple 'modern' flower display – no skill needed for this. Remembering the 'odd number principle', take three or five stems, shorten by half and strip the lower leaves

Bunch the heads together to resemble one large 'flower' and plonk them into a vase or container that will keep the stems close together – a jam jar is ideal. Just add a 'frill' of some contrasting foliage if you want to be really arty; it will last for ages and the stems usually sprout roots as well for potting up later on.

September tips:

It's essential to water Camellias now and into October to ensure a good show of flowers in spring.

When tidying up/cutting back plants, trees or shrubs do it *before* you cut the lawn so that any debris left behind can be gobbled up, leaving the lawn nice and tidy.

I *always* manage to do it the other way round!!

Constable Country Medical Practice Practice Update August 2018

Flu Clinics

The influenza vaccination programme will be different this year. Public Health England have decided that all patients aged 65 on or before 31st March 2019 will be offered a free trivalent adjuvanted vaccination. This is more effective for over 65's than the quadrivalent vaccine administered last year. There is only one supplier of the adjuvant vaccine in the UK and the practice is currently waiting for vaccine delivery dates to be confirmed.

Patients in 'at risk' groups under the age of 65 will be offered a free quadrivalent vaccination.

Children in 'at risk' groups between the ages of 2 and 18, and all children aged 2-3 (born between 1st Sept 2014 and 31st August 2016) will be offered a free quadrivalent nasal vaccination. Note that children between the ages of 4 and 9 years old will be offered a free vaccination via the school immunisation programme.

In addition to offering flu vaccinations we will also be administering pneumococcal and shingles vaccinations to eligible patients.

Because of the introduction of a third flu vaccine and staged vaccine deliveries, the vaccination programme is far more complex this year. We will therefore hold a number of flu clinics and will send personalised letters to every eligible patient inviting them to attend on specific dates. These letters will be sent through September and October.

It is difficult to predict how serious flu outbreaks in the UK will be this year, but maximising vaccination of young children, over

65's and 'at risk' patients offers the best protection. If you receive a letter from the practice confirming you are eligible, please ensure you attend one of our clinics.

Patient Feedback

Thank you to all patients who have completed one of our new comment cards or put a smiley face on the magnetic board in the waiting area at East Bergholt (we will shortly be installing one at Capel).

We review all feedback received and discuss it with our Patient Participation Group to agree further improvements we can make to the service we provide. Comment cards are available from all our clinicians and our receptionists. You can also provide feedback via our website, NHS Choices or the Healthwatch Suffolk website. We appreciate all feedback!
